

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
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# 1960 Hunting Seasons and Regulations

In recent weeks hunters have been getting themselves in shape physically by conditioning muscles and co-ordinating sight, to be ready for the approaching hunting seasons. With this completed, and a season or two already under their belts, they are wondering what hunting prospects are in store for the remainder of the year. With the bulk of the Kansas game bird seasons in the immediate offing, nimrods of this state can look optimistically toward a good year in the field. Game surveys completed in August, and reports from the field, revealed more birds than first thought possible; however, extreme adverse weather conditions which occurred during late winter and early spring has had its effect, especially in regard to quail populations. A summary on the more important species follows:

**QUAIL:** Hunters should not look forward to a season compared to the banner year of 1959. The quail population is down in relation to last year as a result of early spring adverse weather conditions. The hunting prospect, however, is not as dark as first expected. Late spring and summer nesting conditions and reproduction were favorable, assuring a fair to good season.

**PHEASANT:** Pheasant hunters can look forward to the opening of the season with the assurance that, with weather permitting, it should be the best season in the state's history. The 26-day season, lengthened by 6 days this year, will be open in 63 counties. The tremendous number of pheasants in the state will

provide plenty of good hunting throughout the longer season.

**PRAIRIE CHICKEN:** The three-day prairie chicken season should again prove popular with Kansas hunters this fall. There will be 28 counties opened to hunting and the area should provide good shooting.

**WATERFOWL:** From observations and studies by the Bureau of Sport Fisheries and Wildlife, it appears there will be no significant change in the number of all species of waterfowl which utilize the central flyway. Water conditions were much improved in the nesting areas of Canada and Northern United States over 1959; however, nesting cover was sparse resulting in only slight increases in populations. There will be no open season on canvasback and redhead ducks in 1960 due to continued low population of these species. Water and food conditions are, in general, good in the state for waterfowl and a season compared with last year can be expected.

**RABBITS AND SQUIRRELS:** Abundant supply available to furnish good hunting. Squirrel season closes on November 30, however, rabbits may be taken December 15 through October 15, and on those days that quail, pheasant and prairie chicken may be hunted.

**RACCOON:** The masked animal with the ring tail is very common in Kansas and the population throughout the state is at a very high level. The raccoon season was extended this year and it is now permissible to take this abundant animal from September 1 through

May 30. The season is closed only during the months of June, July and August. High population and other factors account for liberalizing the season.

The hunting regulations for 1960:

**Quail:** November 11, 12, 13, 15, 17, 19, 20, 22, 24, 25, 26, 27, 29, December 1, 3, 4, 6, 8, 10 in all counties. Daily bag limit, 6; possession limit after opening day, two days' bag limit. Shooting hours from one-half hour before sunrise to 4 p. m.

**Pheasants:** November 5 to 30, both dates inclusive, in the following counties: Barber, Barton, Cheyenne, Clark, Clay, Cloud, Comanche, Decatur, Dickinson, Edwards, Ellis, Ellsworth, Finney, Ford, Gove, Graham, Grant, Gray, Greeley, Hamilton, Harper, Harvey, Haskell, Hodgeman, Jewell, Kearny, Kingman, Kiowa, Lane, Lincoln, Logan, McPherson, Meade, Mitchell, Morton, Ness, Norton, Osborne, Ottawa, Pawnee, Phillips, Pratt, Rawlins, Reno, Republic, Rice, Rooks, Rush, Russell, Saline, Scott, Seward, Sheridan, Sherman, Smith, Stafford, Stanton, Stevens, Thomas, Trego, Wallace, Washington, and Wichita. Daily bag limit, 4 cock birds; possession limit after opening day, two days' bag limit. Shooting hours from one-half hour before sunrise to sunset. Pheasants in possession of hunters and in lockers must retain head and feet.

**Prairie Chicken:** October 29, 30, 31 in the following counties: Allen, Anderson, Butler, Bourbon, Chautauqua, Cowley, Coffey, Chase, Crawford, Douglas, Elk, Franklin, Geary, Greenwood, Jackson, Linn, Lyon, Marion, Morris, Nemaha, Neosho, Osage, Pottawatomie, Riley, Shawnee, Wabaunsee, Wilson, Woodson. Daily bag limit, 2; possession limit, two days' bag limit. Shooting hours from one-half hour before sunrise to sunset.

**Ducks** (except canvasback and redhead), **Coots**, and **Mergansers:** October 15 to December 13, both dates inclusive; *Provided*, That there is no open season on canvasback and redhead ducks. Daily bag limit on ducks, 3; possession limit, 6. The daily bag and possession limits may not include more than 1 wood duck. Daily bag limit on coots, 6; possession limit, 12. Daily bag limit on American and red-breasted mergansers is 5, possession limit 10, singly or in the aggregate of both kinds. Daily bag and possession limit on hooded mergansers, 1. Hooded mergansers (but not American and red-breasted mergansers) must be included in the established daily bag and possession limits for other ducks. Shooting hours for ducks, coots and mergansers will be from one-half hour before sunrise to sunset except on opening day when shooting hours on all species will start at 12 o'clock noon.

**Geese:** October 7 to December 20, both dates inclusive. Daily bag and possession limit on geese, 5; *Provided*, That the daily bag and possession limits may not include more than 2 Canada geese or subspecies; or 1 white-fronted goose; or 1 Canada goose or its subspecies and 1 white-fronted goose. Shooting hours from one-half hour before sunrise to sunset, including the opening day of the season.

**Mourning, Turtle Doves:** September 1 to October 30, both dates inclusive. Daily bag limit, 15; possession limit, 30. Shooting hours from one-half hour before sunrise to sunset.

**Rails and Gallinules:** September 1 to October 20, both dates inclusive. Daily bag and possession limit on sora rail, 25. Daily bag and possession limit on other rails and gallinules, single or in the aggregate, 15. Shooting hours are from one-half hour before sunrise to sunset.

**Wilson's Snipe:** September 15 to October 14, both dates inclusive. Daily bag and possession limit, 8. Shooting hours are from one-half hour before sunrise to sunset.

**Woodcock:** October 1 to November 9, both dates inclusive. Daily bag limit, 4; possession limit, 8. Shooting hours from one-half hour before sunrise to sunset.

**Squirrel:** July 1 to November 30, inclusive. Daily bag

limit, 8; possession limit, two days' bag limit. Shooting hours from one-half hour before sunrise to sunset.

**Rabbits:** Closed season on rabbits from October 16 to December 14, inclusive, except rabbits may be legally taken during the legal open season for the taking of quail, pheasant, and prairie chicken. Daily bag limit on cottontails, 10; possession limit, 20. No bag or possession limits on jack-rabbits. Shooting hours from one-half hour before sunrise to sunset. Rabbit hunters unless otherwise exempt from hunting license requirements, must have a license to hunt rabbits.

**Fur-bearing Animals** (except otter, badger, beaver, and raccoon): Open season, December 1 to January 31, both dates inclusive.

**Beaver:** Open season, January 1 to February 28, both dates inclusive.

**Raccoon:** Open season, September 1 to May 31, both dates inclusive.

**Red and Gray Fox and Badger:** No closed season.

**Swift or Prairie Fox:** No open season.

**Otter:** No open season.

**Duck Stamp:** No person who has attained the age of 16 years shall hunt for or take any migratory waterfowl unless at such time he or she is in possession of an unexpired Federal migratory bird stamp (duck stamp), validated by the signature of owner written across the face of the stamp in ink.

**Quail Stamp:** All persons who hunt quail and are required to have a hunting license must also procure and affix to that license a quail stamp with the owner's name written across the face of the stamp in ink.

**Possession Period:** The postseason period for possession of game birds legally taken remains the same as in previous years, 30 days following the close of the open season for the taking of such game birds.

**Other Hunting Regulations:** No game bird or game animal shall be shot at, killed or pursued from a motorboat, airplane, or automobile and no wild game bird shall be shot at or killed unless that bird is in flight.

It is unlawful to hunt and kill wild game birds and wild game animals with gun larger than ten gauge.

It is unlawful to hunt, kill, pursue or have in possession any wild song and insectivorous bird or destroy the nests or eggs of such birds.

It shall be unlawful to use directly or indirectly live waterfowl decoys for the taking of waterfowl, nor may waterfowl be taken by means, aid or use of cattle, horses or mules, or by baiting.

The use of shotguns in the taking of waterfowl and doves is permitted providing such guns are not capable of holding more than three shells in magazine and chamber combined. The use of plugs in automatic and repeating shotguns is permitted providing such plugs cannot be removed without disassembling gun.


Immediately after a swim, otters dry their coats by shaking themselves vigorously and rolling over and over in snow or grass.



## A Place to Hunt!


*Finding a place to hunt can sometimes be a problem.*

*The solution for many hunters may be use of public hunting grounds. Try it this year, you might be surprised.*

Would you like to have hunting privileges on thousands of acres of land? Well, you do. And what's more, this is top-flight game land, managed for maximum production of wildlife. What's the story? It all revolves around a division of the Kansas Forestry, Fish and Game Commission called the Land Management division.

In the first place, it might be well to point out that these thousands of acres of public hunting land are not all in one piece or in one section of the state. Public hunting lands are to be found within two or three hours driving time of nearly every citizen of Kansas.

In recent years, more and more land under private ownership is being withdrawn from availability to the public due to a number of factors. Farmers are posting their land to prevent crop damage, and trespass by thoughtless and careless hunters. Some landowners are leasing hunting rights to increase their over-

all income from the land. Other lands, formerly supporting wildlife, have been absorbed into ever-expanding urban areas. Yes, the problem of finding a place to hunt is growing year by year. One of the solutions to this problem is public hunting areas.

Such public hunting areas are not the only recourse to the hunter but they certainly provide hunting opportunities for those who are not acquainted with any landowners and find it difficult to obtain permission to hunt on private lands. Some hunters may pick these lands by choice since all are managed for maximum production of game.

If you are sufficiently aroused at this point, you are doubtless inquiring as to the exact location of these public hunting areas. In general, with the exception of waterfowl hunting, they are to be found at the federal reservoirs. The fish and game commission is actively managing wildlife areas at four of the large reservoirs in Kansas. Since each has different characteristics, we'll try to bring you up to date on them individually.

Cedar Bluff reservoir in northwest Kansas offers the largest acreage open to public hunting. The 5,731 acres designated as wildlife lands offers shooting for adequate numbers of pheasants, rabbits and waterfowl and a small number of quail. The land is generally sharply rolling with deep ravines leading to the water's edge. A small amount of cropland at the upper end of the lake provides some flatland hunting and also winter food for wildlife in unharvested crops. Public hunting lands are on both sides of the lake with those on the north side being the most readily accessible. With most of the area being in grassland, the best hunting is probably in the thickets and heavy cover of the draws. Hunting in this area is not for the lazy or infirmed. Plenty of walking is in order but those who are energetic can be amply rewarded. Duck and goose hunting is also good at Cedar Bluff with most waterfowl hunters using the upper end of the reservoir. Blinds of a temporary nature may be used but all materials used must be removed at the end of the season.

A complete rundown of the regulations covering hunting at the reservoirs will be given at the end of this report.

Webster Reservoir, which lies to the north and east of Cedar Bluff, is also under the management of the Commission and contains 2,089 acres of wildlife lands open to hunting. The acreage is about equally divided between croplands and grassland. This is an ideal area for pheasant production and boasts a heavy population of these game birds. Adequate roads for access are available but walking is a necessity after one reaches the hunting lands. As in all public hunting

areas, the lands are cropped on a share basis with the state's share generally left in the field for winter food. This is not only helpful for upland game, it is attractive to waterfowl which use the reservoir during the fall and winter.

Nineteen hundred sixty acres of Wildlife lands are found at Lovewell reservoir in north-central Kansas. This area has been extensively developed for wildlife with cover plantings, terraces and contour planting of the cropland. Excellent populations of quail, pheasants and other game species are found here. Lovewell also attracts good duck and goose populations and hunters can usually do well in bagging their share. Due to its more level nature, a large part of the land is cropped with areas in between established in heavy cover for protection of the birds. Lovewell reservoir is one of the most desirable in Kansas and heavy use of the public hunting lands is expected this fall.

The most recent addition to the Fish and Game Commission's reservoir lands is at the new Toronto reservoir in southeast Kansas. Control of this land, amounting to 4,366 acres, was gained by the Commission only this last spring and therefore, not much management has been possible up to the moment. However, the area will be open to public hunting this fall even though fencing and signs will not be completed. Hunters using this area should be cautious not to trespass on private property which is adjacent to the reservoir area. This land is characteristic bottom land with grassed hills surrounding. Trees and undergrowth along with cropland make it a quail hunter's paradise. There are good flocks of prairie chicken in the vicinity which may come into the croplands to feed. Good squirrel hunting may also be expected on this public hunting area.

Not all public hunting is located at federal reservoir areas. Most hunters are aware of the fact that portions of the Cheyenne Bottoms Waterfowl Refuge and the Marais des Cygnes Waterfowl Refuge are open to duck and goose hunting during the regular season. At the Cheyenne Bottoms 167 concrete pit blinds are available to hunters on a drawing basis at \$1 per day. These blinds are located in pools 2, 3 and 4. They are designed as two man units but can accommodate a three man hunting party. Shooting is prohibited between the dikes and the shooting area line 1,200 yards out from the dikes except from the blinds. Beyond this shooting area line to the edge of state property, waterfowl hunting is permitted on a free walk-in basis. Those using the prepared blinds must check in at the headquarters building to obtain a key before going on out to hunt. An important point to remember is that hip boots should be included in the hunting gear since one must wade from the dikes to the blinds.

At the Marais des Cygnes Refuge, waterfowl hunting is permitted in Unit "B." This is the portion of the refuge which lies between the Marais des Cygnes river, U. S. Highway 69 and the north Boicourt road. Here, as on federal reservoirs, temporary blinds may be used provided they are removed at the end of hunting. Squirrels may also be hunted on a portion of the refuge different than that which is open to waterfowl. To be specific, areas "C" and "D" of the refuge are open for "bushy tail" shooting. Anyone planning to hunt should check in at the manager's office or residence before entering the area. By doing so, he can get exact information as to the boundary lines of the open areas.

Kearny County State Lake and Republic County State Lake are two more locations where public hunting is available for ducks and geese. These lakes have been open to waterfowl hunting for many years and produce well for hunters, providing mostly duck shooting. Adequate natural cover is usually available at Kearny County State Lake where cottonwoods, willows and other vegetation grow along the shoreline. Temporary blinds may be used at Republic County State Lake as long as they are removed when the hunting season closes.

In addition to all the areas mentioned, other lands not directly controlled by the Forestry, Fish and Game Commission are open to public hunting. Kanopolis Reservoir in central Kansas has approximately 5,000 acres of agricultural lands with fair populations of pheasants and quail. Waterfowl hunting may be had either in the fields surrounding or at specified locations along the shoreline. Each fall, blind locations are staked out along the shore in the open areas and allocations are made by drawing. A person who draws one of the blind locations is entitled to use it for the season and must remove his blind following the close of the hunting season. It is always best to contact the reservoir manager before hunting since most reservoir lands at Kanopolis are not fenced off from private surrounding lands.

Fall River Reservoir in southeast Kansas also has a large amount of public hunting lands, in the neighborhood of 10,000 acres. These are all agricultural lands which border the reservoir. Quail, squirrel, rabbit and waterfowl are all in abundance and the area also provides some prairie chicken hunting. Thirty-five blind locations are staked out at the beginning of the season on the lake shore and are made available to hunters on a first come, first served basis. Once a hunter is assigned one of these blind areas, he retains hunting rights until the end of the waterfowl season. Here again, one should contact the reservoir office as to boundaries before hunting.

Kirwin Reservoir, managed by the U. S. Fish and Wildlife Service as a waterfowl refuge, will also have some lands open to public hunting for the first time this year. This area should provide fine waterfowl and pheasant hunting. Complete information on what area is open may be had by stopping at the refuge headquarters or by writing Larry Means, Manager, Kirwin National Wildlife Refuge, Box 166, Kirwin, Kansas.

One of the primary considerations for anyone planning to hunt on any of the federal reservoir areas should be to determine without doubt the exact lands which are open to hunting. All recreation areas including camping, picnic, cabin, club and group camping areas are closed to hunting. Only those lands designated as wildlife or agricultural lands are open. This regulation includes all reservoirs in the state, not just those managed by the Fish and Game Commission.

On those reservoirs managed by the Commission, the carrying of loaded firearms in a motor vehicle is prohibited so hunters are cautioned not to load their guns until they reach the hunting lands. Although dogs are banned from the recreation areas unless on a leash or confined, they may be used on the public hunting areas for hunting purposes. The construction of any permanent facility including hunting blinds is not permitted except by permit from the Forestry, Fish and Game Commission. Hunters may construct temporary blinds from natural materials on the area provided the blinds are removed or destroyed following hunting.

With the advent of new reservoirs in Kansas, hunters can expect more and more land to become available for public hunting. The Kansas Forestry, Fish and Game Commission is at present making plans to work out agreements with the construction authorities to obtain wildlife lands at several new federal reservoirs now under construction. As these plans materialize, additional lands will be managed for game production and more acres will be available to the sportsman. This is a far-sighted plan which will be to the benefit of all hunters, wherever they may be.

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At one time there were as many as five billion passenger pigeons in the United States. The last of these birds died in a Cincinnati zoo in 1914. Their extermination was due to unrestricted "market" hunting.

## Fall Fishing

With the coming of cooler weather in the fall many fishermen overlook or fail to take advantage of one of the most productive fishing periods of the year. After the heat of the summer it is usually a real pleasure to indulge in a little fall fishing.

Fall temperatures may be brisk at times but there are many warm days during October and November when fish are really biting. Water cools much more slowly than air, and even though the day may be cool, it has little effect on the water temperature.

Cooler water during the fall months seems to stimulate the appetite of many species of fish, and as long as the water temperature stays above 40° to 50° F. for at least part of the day, this feeding activity continues. As the water temperature slowly drops the fish gradually become sluggish and do not put up the fight that they will in warmer water.

Many of the regular types of bait are excellent but for bass and channel cat a person should try minnows first. Minnows are usually the best bait for crappie any time during the year, but many people use too large a minnow for this specie.

Each locality will have a particular type of bait that will catch more fish than any of the others, but it is unusual for any type of bait to be good over the entire year. This is particularly true of channel cat baits but applies to nearly all other types as well. Minnows are an excellent bait during the fall for the simple reason that many small fish are available as food, and are being utilized by the predator species.

Artificial lures can also be used in fairly clear water with good results. It will be necessary to experiment some and to find out how deep the fish are staying, but as a usual rule bass will be in deeper water and crappie will work in closer to shore. Sheltered and brushy areas are usually the best places to fish in lakes. A fisherman should have a good variety of lures in his tackle box at all times. During the early part of the season top water lures are excellent, but as the water cools it is necessary to use lures that run deeper. Another mistake that many fishermen make is to retrieve a lure too fast. In cooler water a bass is not as active as he was when the water was warmer, and cannot move as quickly.

River and creek fishing in Kansas is usually limited for the most part to members of the catfish family and carp. Channel cats are the most popular fish of this group, and not without reason as the gameness and fine eating qualities of channel cats are well known.

A number of flathead catfish are caught every year out of the larger creeks and rivers. The high qualities of this species come from the large size and the specific type of fishing that is required to catch this fish.

Flathead catfish are very few in numbers when compared to other species. In maximum size the flathead is second only to the blue catfish. Baits vary for this species but, again, minnows should be used when in doubt; for the best result with larger flatheads a 6"-8" fish should be used. Flatheads move around very little during the day and venture out to feed at night. Usual hangouts are under old tree roots and fallen brush. After dark is when this species comes into its own, and that is when to fish for flatheads.

Only a very few rivers in Kansas have blue catfish as members of the fauna. Many people confuse channel catfish with blue cats during the spawning season. At this time of the year, male channel cats sometimes turn a dark blue color, and glands on the side of the head may enlarge and change the appearance of this specie entirely. However, by late summer this phase has usually regressed to the stage where very few blue catfish catches are reported. Blue cats are found naturally in Kansas only in the larger rivers in the eastern part of the state. A close look at the anal fin on one of these fish is sufficient to tell the difference from a channel. Where the channel fin is rounded, the blue cat fin is almost straight and the base of the fin is much longer than on the channel.


As the fall season progresses and the weather gradually becomes cooler a change can sometimes be noted in lakes and larger ponds. In some instances the water will become murky and sometimes mats of algae can be observed floating on or near the surface of the water. This is called the fall overturn and is caused by the gradual cooling of the water.

Water is a much more stable substance than air and usually lags behind air temperatures by about six weeks. Lakes that have some deep water may stay fairly warm at the upper levels until late December or on into January. This may seem strange but it is actually very simple to explain. As the surface of any body of water has the only contact with cooler air most of the heat transferred must pass through this surface layer. As the surface loses heat and becomes colder, it also becomes heavier than the warmer water below and sinks to the bottom. This process continues until the water has cooled to about 39° F. At this temperature water has reached its greatest density and any further cooling will only result in the top layer of the lake becoming cooler. As this layer is now cooler than 39° F. and weighs less than the water below, it will stay at the surface. Any cooling after this effects only the upper part of the lake, and eventually a thin layer of ice will form over the surface. When this happens it is usually time to return the rod to the closet until next year. A few hardy individuals like to ice fish but for most fishermen this is the end of the fishing season.

The scaup duck has been known to dive to depths of 20 feet for food.

# Kansas Bird Life

**SHOVELLER** . . . No. 13 in a series

**WHERE FOUND IN KANSAS**—The shoveller, or “spoon-bill” as he is more commonly known to the Kansas duck hunter, is one of our more common migrants, moving through this state mainly in October and again in March and April. During the height of the spring or fall migration one can expect to find the shoveller throughout the state, some of their favorite haunts being sloughs, marshes, muddy ponds, and mud-bottomed shallow lakes and streams. Although many spoonies remain in Kansas well into spring, only a very few nest here. A few nests have been reported from central and southwestern Kansas. The bird is also rare in this state during the winter.

**IDENTIFYING CHARACTERISTICS**—The shoveller is a well-named duck. His genus name, *Spatula*, means “spoon,” and the large spoon-shaped bill which this species possesses is the best single identifying feature during all seasons. The spoonie is a medium-sized duck, larger than a teal but smaller than a mallard or pintail, and weighing in the neighborhood of one and one-fourth to one and one-half pounds. In the spring the male shoveller is a gaudy drake indeed, with his dark green head, white chest, chestnut red sides and belly, orange-red legs and blue wing patches. Don't look for this colorful drake in October when you are out gunning, however. Then he wears a plumage much like the drab female, having an over-all mottled gray-brown appearance. As winter approaches the male's plumage will change gradually to the bright pattern that distinguishes him in the spring. The bill of the shoveller is long and widened toward the end. It is longer than the head, and so large that it tends to give the bird an overbalanced appearance and to make the wings in flight appear

to be set far back. The bill is equipped with bristle-like strainers along its edges. These serve to sift food from the water and bottom ooze as this puddle duck feeds. These birds ride low on the water with bills pointing downward. In feeding they may swim slowly through the water with bills half submerged, or tip up like other puddle ducks.

**SIMILAR SPECIES**—No other duck has a bill comparable to that of the shoveller. In flight its blue shoulder patches might lead the novice to confuse it with the blue-winger teal, but the larger size and big bill will distinguish it. Hunters sometimes mistake the female (or male in eclipse plumage) for a hen mallard.

**VOICE**—The female utters a quack somewhat like the mallard hen but more feeble and raspy. The male is usually silent except during the breeding season when he gives forth with some guttural clucks and rattles.

**HABITS**—Spoonies usually fly in small flocks. When alarmed they can move rapidly, flying somewhat in the erratic fashion of teal at speeds of 40 to 55 miles per hour. This bird can arise nearly vertically from the water, and is known for the rattling sound made by its wings when alighting or taking off. It often decoys well, and is a common duck in the hunter's bag during the early part of the season.

Shovellers frequent marshlands and shallow ponds, seldom being seen in any numbers on large deep lakes with little vegetation. Some of the more common foods used by this species are the seeds of sedges, smartweeds, pondweeds and grasses, algae, plant roots, and animal matter such as insects and their larvae, crayfish, mollusks and fish. Those individuals which feed mostly on animal matter do not develop

very edible flesh, and for this reason many sportsmen avoid this species as a bird for the table. Many spoonies, though, are fairly good eating, providing meat no more strongly flavored than that of several other ducks.

The spoonbill nests on land, usually in grassy cover. The nest may be close to water or well back on the dry prairie. The normal clutch consists of 10 to 12 eggs of a pale olive-buff color. Incubation takes about 23 days. The female is left with the full responsibility of incubation of the eggs and rearing of the young, as in most species of ducks, while the male goes off to join other drakes and begin his molt. It is not uncommon for one female to have two male suitors in attendance during the breeding season. This is a rather unusual situation in the bird world, but apparently it suits the shoveller.

### On Our Cover

This picture illustrates the fact that you don't need a blind to hunt doves. It also points up the fact that you don't have to walk your legs off to get birds. Just find a pond or water hole and sit down; they'll come to you.

Dove hunting is finding more participants each year and populations are still on the increase. The liberal season and bag limit this year induced many to give this sport a try.

### Whoopers Set to Fly Again

Nearly every sportsman in Kansas has, by now, heard of the whooping crane. With today's modern communication facilities, there is certainly no excuse for anyone to be ignorant of this great white bird and its fight for existence.

The months of October and November mark the fall migration of whoopers from the nesting lands in the north to the wintering grounds in Texas. This means that the whoopers will pass through our state at almost any time in those months and, of course, sportsmen should be on the lookout for them.

The U. S. Fish and Wildlife Service is asking help again this year to spot the flight of whoopers as they pass through the central part of the country. This will be the second year for the definite logging of the southward migration. Any person seeing a big white bird with black wing tips, a wingspread of from five to seven feet and a length of about five feet from head to foot should relay the information to their nearest game protector, the headquarters of the Fish and Game Commission or the nearest employee of the U. S. Fish and Wildlife Service. The birds usually migrate in small groups, sometimes in pairs and on rare instances, alone. Coloration of the young whooping cranes hatched this year is not white but a brownish-gray. The young are almost always in the company of two or more adults. The purpose of logging the flight is two-fold. It affords better protection for the birds on the current flight and it gives migration information which can aid in implementing future flights.

Last winter there were 39 whooping cranes known to be in existence. Of these, 33 were wild and had spent the winter at Aransas National Wildlife Refuge in Texas and on coastal islands nearby. Of the six birds in captivity, five were in the New Orleans zoo and the sixth was at the zoo in San Antonio. Only 31 whoopers migrated north this year, two choosing to remain on or near the Aransas refuge. Reports from Canada indicate that four young whoopers have been sighted during the summer.


Whooping cranes nest in Wood Buffalo Park, just south of Great Slave Lake in Canada, about 2,500 miles from their wintering ground. Arrival of the birds at Aransas ranges from early October to mid-December.

The voice of the mountain lion has long been a subject of controversy. However, experts believe their calls are similar to those of a house cat but magnified many times in volume and depth of tone.





# Nemaha County State Lake

The State Lakes of Kansas . . . Tenth of a series

In many years of traveling about the state of Kansas, I had never before been to Nemaha County State Lake or ever very close to it, that is until this summer. I am sure that there are many Kansans just like me who overlook these places close to home and venture far afield in the search for the just-right spot for a weekend of camping, fishing and other outdoor recreation. It didn't take long for me to realize I had been missing something good and satisfying.


Nemaha County State Lake is truly a beautiful body of water nestled between verdant hills of green. Almost all of the northeast Kansas north of the Kaw river is characterized by these rolling waves of grassland interspersed by wooded valleys and streams of various sizes.

Like several other of the older state lakes, Nemaha County State Lake was a project constructed by the Civilian Conservation Corps (commonly known as CCC) in the year 1934. The 760 acres of land on which the lake is located was donated to the Kansas Forestry, Fish and Game Commission by the citizens

of Nemaha county as a memorial to the war veterans of that county. The dam across the Nemaha river was constructed in a north-south direction and carries State Highway 63 which connects with U. S. 36 at Seneca, four miles north of the park. Because of its proximity to a major tourist route, many campers

use the facilities each year and some have returned time after time.

Kansans also like to use the campgrounds and picnic tables at this lake and one can see many different counties represented by the different license tags on a summer weekend. The major attraction is naturally the fishing but others come for the pleasant surroundings and fun of outdoor living. The facilities at this lake are excellent and well maintained.

Among those things which are attractive to many are a swimming pool, stone shelter house, bathhouse with showers and well kept picnic and camping areas. Park Superintendent William Diggs spends countless hours during the summer months in keeping the area mowed and the trash removed. Visitors can always count on "Bill" to lend assistance in many ways. He'll be glad to help you find a place to camp, tell you the latest fishing information or just chat for a few minutes.

The citizens of Seneca have been generous with their time and money in helping with the many facilities at this park. The Lions Club along with help from the Chamber of Commerce have just recently installed a pressure system to provide running water

at the campground and at the bathhouse. This system replaces an older gravity system which was no longer adequate. These two organizations were also responsible for the development of the swimming pool and equipping the children's playground.

At the time the lake was constructed, nearly all the land in the drainage area was in native grass pasture. However, some of this land was broken up for crops

during the 40's. The result was, as could be expected, an inflow of silt into the lake reducing its desirability as a fishery resource. Never-the-less, Nemaha County State Lake continues to produce fair to good fishing for channels, crappie, flatheads and bluegill. Large numbers of bullheads are also caught. Some truly large flatheads are taken, occasionally in the neighborhood of fifty pounds.

Local residents tell of the canoe fisherman who was pulled all over the lake while hooked fast to a monster of a fish. After a battle lasting over two hours, the giant finally made his escape by running into a brush pile and breaking off. Most of the large flatheads are taken on heavy tackle with large chubs or small sunfish for bait. The majority of the channel catfish fishermen at this lake use either chicken livers or blood but other baits seem to produce well at times. Due to the turbidity of the water, bass are not frequently taken but are present in the lake in limited numbers.

Although there is no concession in operation on the lake, a steak house is located just off the park property on the east side. Around the east and north sides of the park are several cabins, located on private property. The south and southwest parts of the park are quite heavily vegetated with the entire western shore south of the dam a virtual wilderness. Trails through the trees afford access to the shoreline for fishermen. Many different species of birds and small animals may be seen in this part and deer are known to frequent the area.


Located just west of the superintendent's residence is what is called the "guest cabin." This building is equipped with tables and a fireplace and is popular as a meeting place for local groups and organizations. Advance reservations are necessary for the use of this facility. Also popular is the native stone shelter house on the east shore of the lake.

Picnic facilities are located at strategic points in well shaded areas. The major camping area is found close to the main entrance at the north end of the dam. Here a grove of trees affords an excellent camping spot and a check on almost any summer evening will reveal families from many different states enjoying the pleasures of tent and trailer living. Picnic tables and grills are provided.

Maybe Nemaha County State Lake is just the place you have been looking for. If you have never been there, give it a try. You'll join many others who come back again and again to fish or just enjoy the scenery. If you happen to catch one of those whoppers, have your picture taken and send it to us. 


### Plastic Rabbit Food?



Buffle-head ducks use old woodpecker holes or natural hollows in trees as nesting sites.




